III. Annual Report of Rotarian Action Group Activities (required)

Please describe any major international service projects or other activities undertaken by your group during the past Rotary year.

I. From July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009: 97 projects were taken up or continued. Total amount-\$6,678,186. Please see Addendum 1 for the full/detailed list of RFPD Projects.

Highlights from the Projects list that total \$100,000 or more:

- 1) "Vocational Training, Child Spacing & Micro-Credit in Slums of Alexandria, Egypt" (D 2450) RC and RAC Alexandria Cosmpolitan. International sponsor, Rotaract Germany (D 1860). Project amount: \$100,000, duration/year 2003-2010. Egypt section initiated and is implementing the project. German Section sponsors/monitors and cofunds. "Best European Rotaract Project 2006" Award from EUCO.
- 2) "Improvement of Maternal Health Prevention and Treatment of Obstretric Fistula" in Kano and Kaduna states, Nigeria (D 1920). Project amount: EURO 1.000.000, duration/year 2005-2009. There are 9 German districts and 2 Austrian districts co-sponsoring, along with 60 Rotary Clubs, 22 Inner Wheel and one Rotaract Club. This is RFPD's largest project, and is a replicable model. The project was acknowledged by the Emir of Zaria, Kaduna state, and at the WHO Stillbirth Conference. In the first half of 2009, we documented a reduction of maternal deaths up to 50 % in our selected hospitals. Rotary satellite projects and contribution of stakeholders have effectively doubled the project amount of maternal health project from one to two million Euro. As a result of RFPD work since 1995, especially the intensified public awareness campaign, the Nigerian Government has spent huge sums to improve the physical infrastructure in many of our project hospitals. This has been very encouraging.
- 3) "Equipping Medical & Pediatric Hospitals" in Ghana (D 9100). The Rotary Club of Accra, Ghana. International Sponsor Rotary Club of Cortland, USA (D 7170). Project amount: \$700,000, duration/year 2007-2009. This project was initiated by RFPD member and co-funded by USA District 7170. It includes two Volunteer Service grants.
- 4) "Project for Dramatic Radio Series" (to transmit 208 chapters in 24 months), for all Honduras. The Rotary Club of Tegucigalpa, Honduras (D 4240), project amount: \$1,038,114, duration/year 2007-2010. Design and implementation by RFPD Central America and The Caribbean Coordinator Guillermo Valle, Fundación Bergstrom. This project initiates and creates Soap Operas to prevent pregnancies in adolescents, to delay first sexual experiences, fights against HIV/AIDS, empowering women, vocational and technical education for women, creation of wealth (eradication of poverty), environmental protection and education to reduce infant mortality; Bergstrom Foundation funded US \$150,000.
- 5) "Venezuela Schools and Rotarian Hospital of Barquisimeto" in Venezuela. The Rotary Club of Barquisimeto Nueva Segovia, Venezuela (D 4380). International sponsor Rotary Club of Cortland, Rotary Club of Oneonta and Rotary Club of Cortland Breakfast (D 7170). Project amount: \$711,125, duration/year 2008-20011. Further details: North America & Latin America Section monitors; Venezuelan govt. US \$522,250; Foundation Nena US \$1,000; Smart Team C.A.Bs. US \$69,500; Rotary Hospital Bs.US \$33,500; PRONASIDA US \$24,875; Barquisimeto Nueva Segovia RC US \$5,000; D4380 US \$3,000; Cortland RC US \$1,000; D 7170 US \$4,000; Oneonta RC US \$250; Cortland Breakfast US \$1,000; TRF US \$10,625.

Other project activity: Effect of Mosquito Nets - 24,000 nets were distributed in above mentioned project #2.

• We noticed a threefold effect of insecticide-treated long-lasting mosquito nets, which RFPD distributed in Northern Nigeria to: 1) Combating Malaria; 2) To overcome the remaining resistance against polio immunizations (when we gave mothers nets, they immediately allowed their babies to be immunized); 3) To convince mothers that they should seek antenatal care in hospitals. When hospitals gave pregnant mothers

nets, which we donated to them, this message spread in the villages and pregnant mothers came to the hospitals to seek antenatal care.

- RFPD had excellent exposure and acceptance at the Rotary International (RI) Convention in Birmingham, England, June 2009. Following a broad solicitation for proposals by RI, RFPD was invited to present three workshops:
- 1) Rotary Projects-Reducing Maternal & Child Mortality: The comprehensive approach "Reduction of Maternal and Child Mortality Prevention and Treatment of Obstetric Fistula," successfully running since 2005, was featured. RFPD shared its project expertise with 600 participants. Panelists included: The Nigerian project chairman PDG Kola Owoka; Project staff Zainab Mohammad Pawa, Chief Midwife; Robert Zinser; Dolapo Lufadeju and gynecologist Dr. Hadiza Galadanci, of University Teaching Hospital Kano. During the workshop outgoing RI President, D.K. Lee, was awarded the RFPD Nafis Sadik Award for Courage and responded with inspiring acceptance comments.
- 2) Saheli Centers-Women Helping Women: The 90-minute workshop informed Rotarians about RFPD's successful and expanding Saheli Centers for Women in India. There are now 28 Saheli Centers in the northern states of Bihar and Jkarhand that provide vocational training, education and reproductive health for women and girls. The successes of these projects were displayed, along with concept-expansion and information on how Rotarians can sponsor additional Saheli Centers. There were close to 100 Rotarians and guests in attendance who participated in this exciting workshop.
- 3) Promotion of Child Health by Prevention of Mother-To-Child Transmission (PMTCT) of HIV: Panelists Dolapo Lufadeju, Robert Zinser, midwife Zainab Mohammad Pawa and Dr. Hadiza Galadanci, member of Nigerian PMTCT task team, informed how Rotary promotes Child Health by PMTCT. Dr. Michael Rabbow, Boehringer Ingelheim GmbH, CD Communications, Ingelheim, Germany presented the donation program utilized for this project. Brian Reid of OraSure Technologies presented HIV test on oral fluid instead of blood. RFPD shared its expertise of the PMTCT project in Northern Nigeria with 250 attendees.
- Annual General Meeting Sixty people attended the RFPD Annual General Meeting. RFPD was allotted one hour for the meeting, so this year we ran the meeting as a general business meeting, and did not have a featured speaker as we have done in the past.
- Membership Breakfast A special event was held during the convention that included RFPD & RI leaders, RFPD members and potential members. Twenty-five people were in attendance, and RFPD board members spoke about the future of Rotarian Action Groups.
- Board Meetings Two board meetings were held for RFPD board members, one before the convention and one after. Our board meetings have been opened to include two representatives from each Area. We are grooming new leaders to take on future leadership roles for RFPD, and bring new ideas to the table.

- Exhibit Booth this year we had very good visibility. The RFPD booth also encompassed two additional projects Improvement of Maternal Health and the HIV/AIDS Testing/Zero Adolescent Pregnancy (ZAP) Program booth. Members gained: 14 lifetime and 3 annual.

A. Area North America:

- 1) \$300,000 from The David and Lucile Packard Foundation. Two-year grant from July 2008-June 2010. Funds are distributed for RFPD activities in North America, Europe, India, N. Africa/Egypt, Sub-Sahara and Latin America.
- 2) \$5,000 from donor to redesign RFPD website.

B. Area Europe:

- 1) \$450,000 from German government as annual installment for maternal health project in Northern Nigeria.
- 2) \$450,000 from Aventis Foundation as annual installment for maternal health project in Northern Nigeria.
- 3) \$110,000 from RFPD Germany collected from RFPD members for medical equipment in Nigeria.
- 4) \$168,000 from BASF for total 24,000 insecticide-treated long-lasting mosquito nets as donation-in-kind.
- 5) \$1,200,000 from Bayer-Schering for total 3,000 IUDs (MIRENA) as in-kind donation.
- 6) \$40,000 from Boehringer Co. for drugs used for Prevention of Mother-To-Child-Transmission (PMTCT).
- 7) \$30,000 from German Country to supply solar power for one of our selected hospitals.
- 8) \$25,000 from German University Teaching Hospitals for delivery and hospital beds as in-kind donation.
- 9) Uncounted contributions form the Nigerian government/other stakeholders to our maternal health project.
- C. Area Latin America grant totaling \$688,250, lasting 5-year from 2009-2013. Funds to be distributed for the following items and amounts:
- 1) \$2,375 Western Blot tests Venezuelan government.
- 2) \$534,875 Yearly treatment of patients found to be positive Venezuelan government.
- 3) \$45,000 Condoms Venezuelan Government.
- 4) \$1,000 posters and pamphlets Fundacion Nena.
- 5) \$70,000 public relations from radio, TV and newspapers of Barquisimeto, Venezuela.
- 6) \$35.000 Education and staff support from Rotary Hospital of Barquisimeto. Venezuela.
- 7) OraSure Technologies providing a 60% discount for testing product.
